University of Kentucky Best Practices

- Intentionally hire a multidisciplinary team. CEDIK staff have backgrounds in economics, community development, public health, rural sociology, architecture, landscape architecture, education, arts administration, planning, geography and natural resources.
- Work closely with other Extension program areas.
- Partner with other academic departments outside College/Extension
- Be genuine when you say, "I don't need credit," and be able to stomach it when you don't get the credit
- Take risks Funders don't want to fund the same old, same old
- Be opportunistic and aware
- Avoid mission drift
- Be patient!

Lessons Learned during 16 Years in Arkansas Extension
