From River to Sea: Kayaking Tour of Little River, Wells, Maine

9 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Led by: Caryn Beiter, School and Docent Programs Coordinator, Wells National Estuarine Research Reserve Come explore where the river meets the sea—by kayak! Paddle the quiet waters of the estuary while watching for wildlife and learning about this treasured habitat. This is a relaxing paddling experience appropriate for all levels of kayaking ability. We will begin surrounded by flat salt marsh grass habitat and greener waters, pass through a transition zone of reeds and taller grasses to make our way upriver into thicker forests and darker waters. We will keep our eyes out for kingfishers, snowy egrets, osprey, coyotes, deer and the many other inhabitants of the salt marsh. We will be kayaking closer to low tide than high tide so this should help with our bird viewing opportunities. The tour will stop at a local Maine restaurant on the way back to Portsmouth; please bring money for lunch. This tour welcomes kayakers of all experience. Cost: \$60

The fine print: Maximum weight for kayaks is 325 pounds. Participants must be able to get up from a seated position on the ground. The kayak dock is a quarter-mile walk from the Visitor Center, so participants need to be able to walk on uneven surfaces while carrying a kayak paddle this distance. Please dress for the weather. Layers are a good idea, both for temperature fluctuations and sun protection. Please also bring a reusable water bottle, sunglasses, a hat, and sunscreen with you. Mosquito/tick protection is recommended for the quarter-mile trail walk from our Visitor Center to the dock. Following are optional items to consider: Binoculars, camera/phone, small dry bag to prevent valuables from getting wet, and a light snack.
