

Gateway

...to a state or national park, national forest, recreational area, protected cultural heritage site, or other prominent public lands

Natural Amenity

...community and economic development is closely tied to landscape and natural assets utilized for recreation, tourism, and outdoor-based leisure

Region

...part of a larger region with similar attributes AND/OR a region surrounding a resort-like community



What is a GNAR Community?



Small Town

150-25,000 people



Close proximity to natural amenities

Within 10 miles of a national park, national monument, state park, national forest, lake, or wild and scenic river



Not in an urbanized area

Further than 15 miles from a census designated urbanized area




Big City Problems in Small Rural Towns.....



The Mountain Neighbor Handbook: A Local's Guide to Stewardship in the Tetons

Almost every winter in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, a moose drowns in an artificial pond in someone's backyard when it breaks through a soft spot in the ice above an aerator. If the moose is lucky, Wyoming Game & Fish Department arrives in time to lasso it around the neck and winch it out. Throughout, those witnessing this spectacle are traumatized, as is the moose. Add a calf moose to this equation, and the hysteria, regret, and blame are compounded.

While county regulations exist that stipulate how aerators can be used in ponds, the new owner of a dream home in Jackson is not going to predict this scenario until it literally falls into their backyard.

Teton County is surrounded by some of the most remote and intact wilderness in the lower 48 states, but conservation is at risk of being outpaced by development. Drowning moose are not the only challenge we face. Wildlife conflict, invasive species, stormwater runoff, busy trailheads, energy use, and more—all present similar, sometimes daunting challenges in our community. And, like many rural communities, demands on natural resources intensified during the pandemic with an influx of new residents and increased visitation on public lands.

"Most people mean well and want to lighten their impact on the environment," says Phoebe Coburn, Communications Specialist for Teton Conservation District, "but there's a lack of accessible information and many just aren't aware of regulations and common practices that protect wildlife and the ecosystem."

The need for engaging and action-oriented information about natural resource conservation practices specific to the area—especially on private land—inspired the creation of *The Mountain Neighbor Handbook: A Local's Guide to Stewardship in Teton County.* The 52-page booklet covers everything from wildlife and habitat to energy and




Purpose

- 4. Increase community capacity to become more self-sustaining and resilient to their unique challenges







Course Overview & What to Expect



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Crested Butte, Colorado

"Rapid growth and economic investment in the Gunnison Valley is resulting in compounding challenges that have emerged at an unprecedented scale, including tourism growth, an affordable housing crisis, and a prolific workforce shortage... to name a few.

The challenges Crested Butte is facing are complex. For many years, the Town of Crested Butte has incrementally reacted to these challenges without an established vision for our community's future. These incremental reactions have set Crested Butte on a path to unintentionally take our community where we may not want to go.



Who really is Crested Butte's community and what do we want to become in the future? The Compass set out to answer these questions as navigating the inevitable change that the Town needs to work through, will be less daunting if the Crested Butte community has a collective vision to collaboratively work towards."


The Compass directly states that it was created to be Crested Butte's **North Star**, "...guiding the Crested Butte Town Council through uncertain moments and helping our decision makers negotiate the community's most pressing challenges."

Through an extremely robust community engagement process (which we will highlight more of in Lesson 5), Crested Butte settled on four core community values:

"Crested Butte expects to maintain and retain its community's identity by living intentionally with the community's core values:


- . We are an Authentic community

- . We are a Bold community.






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Jasper, Alberta, Canada: Age-based Outreach + Community Guide



The municipality of Jasper is located within Jasper National Park in Canada's Alberta province. Being an alpine town within a national park brings forth a unique set of challenges, and as such, Jasper staff have proactively designed resources to meet the specific needs of their residents.


For current residents and newcomers, they've developed a Jasper Community Guide, which is a handbook for living, working, and playing in Jasper. Their handbook starts out with several common questions and directs readers to their appropriate sections to ensure that all residents are aware of how to access services and proactively plug into the community. Here's a snapshot of what's included in their Table of Contents:

- What childcare options are available in Jasper? (25)



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




The Gunnison Valley Sustainable Tourism and Outdoor Recreation (STOR) Committee is an outcome from the One Valley Prosperity Project highlighted in Lesson Z. 




